Extremely rare Ward brothers ruddy duck brings top dollar at Frank & Frank auction

N EXTREMELY RARE ruddy duck by the Ward brothers of Crisfield, Maryland sold below estimate to a Maryland collector for \$22,425, the top lot at the Frank & Frank Sporting Collectibles auction on October 16, 2016 at the Shark River Yacht Club in Neptune, New Jersey. Slightly oversized and never used as a decoy, it had been mounted as a decorative carving on a lamp.

An early hollow-carved black duck from the Philadelphia area sold to a phone bidder for \$3738, over ten times the low estimate and the top Delaware River decoy in the sale. Equally as surprising, a hollow-carved brant in old gunning paint by Charles Black of Bordentown, New Jersey brought \$2160, six times the high estimate. A hollow-carved pintail in old gunning paint by Bill Quinn of Bristol, Pennsylvania made estimate at 748. A hollow-carved goldeneye by Caleb "Reg" Marter sold below estimate for

\$690. And a pair of hollow-carved low head pintails by Bob White of Tullytown, Pennsylvania fell short of estimate at \$1150.

A black-bellied plover with a fanciful paint pattern by an unknown maker, from the Turner rig, sold for \$2990, more than double the low estimate and the top coastal New Jersey decoy in the sale. A yellowlegs from the same rig sold for \$1380. A robin snipe attributed to Harry V. Shourds of Tuckerton, but more likely by his neighbor Nate Frazier, sold for \$978.


A near-mint hollow-carved black duck by Capt. Jesse Birdsall of Barnegat sold for its low estimate \$1725. A hollow-carved mallard by John Updike of Green Bank made estimate at \$978. A pair of hollowcarved red-breasted mergansers by Gene Hendrickson of Lower Bank just missed estimate at \$546.

A rare hollow-carved gunning model wigeon by Lloyd Johnson of Bay Head, New Jersey sold over estimate at \$2160. A Lloyd Johnson dove topped estimate at \$1840 and one of his standing black ducks just missed at \$863. A hollow-carved pintail was the best of a group of decoys by Hurley Conklin of Manahawkin, topping estimate at \$489. And a pair of hollow-carved wood ducks by Charlie Birdsall of Point Pleasant brought \$460, exactly half the low estimate.

A pair of hooded mergansers was the best of a group of lots by Delbert "Cigar" Daisey, selling to a phone bidder for \$2760, exactly double the low estimate. Others included a pair of red-breasted mergansers within estimate at \$1955, pair of ruddy ducks at double the low estimate at \$1150 and pair of bluebills at more than double the low estimate at \$978. A coot topped estimate at \$604.

A pair of wigeons with uplifted preened feathers and raised carved wingtips by Bill Gibian of Onancock, Virginia made estimate at \$2665. A pair of his pintails, the drake a preener, sold for its low estimate \$1380. A ruddy turnstone standing on a base and two black-bellied plovers, one a feeder, brought \$920 apiece. A sleeping canvasback by Reggie Birch of Chincoteague made estimate at \$633.
